## A Note From the Chairman of the Board of Directors

After 8 years as a Board member and several years as Board Chair, George Stevens retired from the Board following the Annual General meeting. I want to take this opportunity to publicly thank George for his dedication and Leadership while on the Board. These were difficult years for our Home as well as for all Homes in the Province and George's leadership was critical to guiding us through successfully.

At this time I should introduce myself as the new Board Chair, my name is Brian Harris and I have been on the Board since 2005 and until recently I had the privilege of holding the Office of Treasurer. At the time of my election the following board members were elected as Officers for the Corporation, Gary Rent, Vice Chair, Margie Bowlin Secretary and Walter Meech as Treasurer. As well Beverley Campbell has joined the Board this fall. At our October meeting we accepted with regret the resignation of Dr Rose McCloskey who was a great asset to the board during her 6 year tenure.

At our September meeting the Board approved a fund raising campaign to raise \$ 120,000, for the purpose of purchasing and maintaining a new wheelchair van. Jon Hovey is the chair of the Fund Raising committee and will guide us through a successful campaign. Vans are very important to our residents as it allows them to leave the home and take in activities in the community as well as provides a means of transportation to Doctor Appointments. The Province does not provide any funding for either the purchase or maintenance of vans which means we must reach out to the community for assistance.

### **From the Accounting Department**

**Canada Revenue Agency – Community Volunteer Income Tax Program** This program is being offered to low income individuals. There is a criteria for annual income per single person \$25,000.00 per year or less; per couple \$35,000.00 per year or less. If your income is just a little over you can still request the service and they may be able to complete your taxes for you. This is a free service available to Staff, Apartment Residents, Nursing Home Residents, Spouses and anyone else that meets the criteria.

In order for the CRA Volunteers to provide this service they need to know how many people would be interested and then they can plan a date to come to Hampton to provide this service. ## Fish Chowder

This is the chowder recipe that we use at the Centre; the residents and staff love it. I add Lobster for special occasions - great for Christmas. Hope you enjoy, and Merry Christmas!

*Dianne Cassidy, Dietary Department*

1lb Fish  
1/2 lb Scallops (cut if large)  
1 cup Shrimp (cut if large or use frozen salad shrimp)  
2 Onions, diced  
3 stalks Celery, diced  
3 Carrots, diced  
2 cups Potatoes, diced



4 cans Baby Clams, drained  
3 cups Cream  
2 1/2 cups Milk (may need more milk)

Place veggies, fish, scallops & shrimp in large pot, don't drain. Add clam juice.

*I put the veggies on the bottom, and use the fish while it is still frozen, so the items that cook quickest go on the top - fish, shrimp & scallops.*

Cover and cook on medium heat for 30 minutes; it will make enough juice to cook. Check to make sure veggies are cooked, then add clams, cream & milk.

If you like a thick chowder, add a Roux:

Melt 4 oz. of Margarine and add 3 oz flour, salt, pepper & parsley. Cook over low heat for 5 minutes, stirring constantly. Add to hot cream mixture.

Simmer chowder for 30 minutes. (Serves 12)

For the past 24 years the Dr V A Snow Centre has been actively supported by our community and we trust this support will continue.

In September the home was put through its paces when a Mock Disaster was carried out. These exercises are very important to ensure staff is fully prepared to do what is necessary in the event a real emergency occurred. The exercise went very well and we are proud of the excellent job performed by staff.

This fall we encountered water damage to a resident's room due to a leak in the sprinkler system. Prompt attention by staff limited the damage and we will soon have remedial action completed. We had been having water leaks in the windows of the fireside lounge and so with funds provided by the Province, new windows were installed this fall.

Our Home, like all homes in the Province is encountering a number of challenges and we have to ensure that we meet the expectations of our residents as well as the community. The Board will therefore be preparing a new Strategic Plan during a Planning session later this month. We have invited stakeholders from the community to assist us in this endeavour. We look forward to sharing the results with you in a future newsletter.

Finally, the staff will be actively involved over the next 6 months in preparing for the renewal of our accreditation. Accreditation is important as it helps ensure we continue to meet not only the high standards of the Province but National Standards as well.

I hope all residents, staff volunteers and members of the Board have an enjoyable Holiday season with family and friends.
